#### From the Headmaster



I am sure that on many a school pupil's Christmas gift list, an end to homework might feature quite high up! You might imagine, though, that it would be a wish shared by few others. Many parents believe that a school can be measured by the hours of homework set for pupils, and many teachers see it as a necessary extension to the work they do in the classroom. A certain ex Chief Inspector of Schools is definitely a great fan. So it may come as a surprise to some of you that within educational circles there is a lively debate about the merits of sending children off to their bedrooms, to do hours of work in splendid isolation. Some say that it even hinders learning. A more considered view is that only some types of homework are beneficial, and that more is not always better than less.

Certainly no child should find that their waking day consists of travelling to and from school, being in school, doing extra work for school when they get home, and then going to bed. There should be time for relaxation, for families, for hobbies, for fresh air. We need to be sure that when homework is set, it stimulates the love of learning rather than tranquillising it! I hope that none of our pupils have got themselves too excited. They will not find an end to homework in their Christmas stocking. But, in the New Year, I do intend to open up the homework debate at Cokethorpe. I think it could be an interesting and fruitful discussion.

# **Examination Results 2008**

Last summer's results may seem a long time ago now, but this is an apposite time to be reading about them. For the Year 11 pupils awaiting mock results, for those pupils cramming for January AS and A2 modules and for the Upper Sixth eager to hear from their selected universities, now is the time to reflect on last year's success and consider how to make 2009 better still.

At GCSE 91% A\*–C passes were obtained with an excellent 31% at A\* and A grades across all subjects. Science topped the table of compulsory subjects with 96% pass and 39% at A\* and A. Other areas of excellence abounded, in particular the Geography and Spanish departments, each with a 100% pass rate and with 52% top grades for Geography and 60% for Spanish.



# **Trip to Lesotho**

As the dust settled on the Summer Term, a group of intrepid Sixth Form students visited the tiny nation of Lesotho, Southern Africa. Accompanied by Mr Uglow and Mrs Copeland, the group spent their first week living and working in the villages around the town of Teyateyaneng. They shopped in the local markets, visited local families, and spent time working in the local secondary school. They took with them a cheque for £7,500 - the result of last year's 5000 miles, 5000 pounds fundraising appeal - to be spent on the construction of a much needed staff room and the boring of a well.

Following their hard work in the village, the students headed into the mountainous interior of the country.



A2 Level results were a similar success story, with 30% of exams taken being passed at grade A and a very impressive average points score of 300, equivalent to BBB. Small wonder then that the table of destinations of the recent leavers looks very impressive indeed – full details can be found on the School website.

AS results are of course a useful indicator of success at A2. The signs look good, with the current Upper Sixth having performed at a very similar level to last year's cohort – great things are expected from them, and reading down the list of universities to which they have applied, it is clear that they are placing high demands on themselves. Good luck to all.



After a six-hour drive along some spectacular roads, they arrived at a remote village called Molumong, where they spent the night, before heading down into South Africa via the incredible Sani Pass – the highest pass in Africa. The exploration of the Drakensburgs took the group to the little-visited national park of Lesotho, Sehlabathebe. Here, students were able to climb the 'Three Bushmen' mountain, pony trek to a hidden waterfall, and discover more about the life of the roaming shepherds.

The trip was a great success and students were introduced to a wide range of new experiences and have built a long-lasting relationship with Lesotho. Thoughts now turn to next summer and the prospect of returning.

# **Philosophy Day**

On 5 November, Year 11 and 12 took part in a Philosophy Day organised by Mr Schofield. All pupils had their 'philosophical health' checked, and attended subject-specific philosophy lessons. After break, all gathered in The Shed for a plenary led by Dr Michael Lacewing on the challenging question 'Where do ideas come from?'. The morning provoked much discussion.



# Year 7 Trip to Blackwell's

The English Department and Library teamed up once again to take Year 7 to the Blackwell's bookshop in Oxford. The aim was to encourage pupils to make informed choices of new and challenging fiction. Pupils have been reading and discussing their responses in their library lessons. Thanks to Natalia de la Ossa and her staff at Blackwell's for organising tours, seminars and short-lists for pupils.

# Year 11 Business Studies

As part of the GCSE Business Studies syllabus the pupils have to complete an investigative report on two contrasting businesses. In June the Business Studies pupils visited the famous Wedgwood factory in Staffordshire, which proved to be a valuable eye opener into the complex process of pottery making. The dexterity and skill of the expert gilders, carefully hand painting some of the world's most famous Wedgwood designs was mesmerising to watch. Much information was gained from the visit and the pupils took notes in preparation for their coursework. They will be comparing the Wedgwood factory to that of Creative Corner in Abingdon, which they visited last term.

# **Kitchen Garden Produce**

Lunchtime at Cokethorpe on Wednesday 8 October was particularly special as the vegetables used for the weekly roast dinner were grown from the School's very own Kitchen Garden. Guided by Miss Townsend, there are a number of pupils that work diligently during AOB and have produced some absolutely remarkable pumpkins and provençale vegetables.



# Year 8 Time Traveller

Year 8 were visited by a representative from the Sealed Knot Society and were able to dress in the body armour of a Cavalryman, and wield the 'Bone Crusher' used by the Musketeer, whilst learning about the problems encountered by those fighting in the English Civil War. The visit will assist pupils on their assessment looking into the way the war divided families and turned society upside down.



# **Film Studies**

Having formally studied *The Kite Runner* in class, the Film Studies students visited the Phoenix Picturehouse to enjoy watching the whole film, where they benefited from a greater understanding and appreciation of the narrative having already explored its micro elements.





# **Good Schools Guide Award**

# **Midyis and Yellis Testing**

Parents of pupils in Years 7 and 10 may be aware that their children have been tested for Midyis and Yellis this term. These are not new tropical diseases but Middle Years and Year Eleven Information Systems, run by the CEM centre at Durham University. Cokethorpe has been involved in this national project for six years. The tests assess the ability of pupils in a variety of tasks, similar to IQ tests, and give information to help the School better target teaching, choose subjects and appraise the value that the School adds to each pupil.

# Year 7 Trip to Warwick Castle

Battling against the freezing wind, and, towards the end of the day, the driving rain, Year 7 made their way to Warwick Castle in order to help them with their assessment project for the Christmas break, which focuses on the way in which castles developed through the Medieval period. Pupils were treated to a guided tour of the castle, and enjoyed time exploring the ramparts and getting a sense of the evolutionary process that started in 1068 when William the Conqueror first ordered the construction of the Motte.




# Age Concern




# **Photography Trip to Bradford**


# Modern Languages Trip

The Good Old Days When I arrived at Cokethorpe almost fifty years ago the attitudes to discipline were somewhat different than today and we were expected to do the bidding of the masters and our seniors without question. Amongst the number of methods available was the use of the cane across the backside of the culprit. Other punishments included detention, essay writing, clearing the school up and being 'gated' (not being allowed out).

To give the impression that Cokethorpe was a school based on a Dickensian novel would be untrue. During my five years at Cokethorpe I was caned on three occasions although others seemed to be caned on a more regular basis. To illustrate the crimes that made one eligible for the cane it would be easier to recount the reasons why I received this punishment:

1) Whilst making our beds after breakfast we decided to hide and leap out on the last one returning to the dorm. It all went well except that the victim screamed in shock when we surprised him. We were next to Matron's room and she didn't appreciate our antics. The Second Master was summoned and all ten of us got two strokes each!

2) The changing rooms were untidy with sport clothes spread everywhere. We were told to clear them up but the prefects found two bits of clothing of mine on the floor. I and several others received a stroke for each item of kit found.

3) Following a disagreement about the need to leave the Dining Room quickly I had to write a small novel on some very boring subject. So lots of adjectives in my best scrawl lead me to being reported to my housemaster and getting six of the best, as they could not read it.

If one knew that you were going to be caned there were steps that could be taken to mitigate the effect of the cane, supposedly. Nothing as crass as putting cushions down one's trousers, but turning ones pants round the other way was a favourite. It was a myth. A lot depended on the person carrying out the punishment – those who could hit the same spot were the ones to avoid!

Although the canings I received were for minor misdemeanours, it did teach me one thing and that was not to get caught!
