From the Headmaster

It would be strange to write for this edition of *The Ocellus* without referring to the impending election, not least because there are students in the School who will, in May, be able to vote for the first time. But I do so with some trepidation. Educational custom has it that, in their official role, headmasters should neither proselytise nor campaign. So I shall tread carefully.

Some pundits are saying that the turnout of voters will be very low, the result of disenchantment with politics and politicians, with sleaze and spin. But low turnout is not new in the UK. In 1918 when universal suffrage was granted to men, less than 60% turned out to vote. In the Twentieth Century overall, only an average of about 70% of those eligible to vote actually did so. There seems to be a lack of engagement, a lack of interest in politics in the UK. Even on days when there is news of great international importance, so many of our newspapers serve up stories about celebrities, often stories about people who are famous for nothing more than being famous. I suppose these papers know what their readers want. Here's the irony, what engages many of those who condemn sleazy politicians is... sleaze.

Some of the blame for this state of affairs must lie with education. From an early age we focus on employment. We have 17 and 18 year olds who haven't studied history or literature for years, and haven't studied philosophy at all. Many lose contact with ideas and think of life only as a weave of work and leisure. Hard thinking is either eschewed altogether, or seen as a necessary evil in the work-place, to be avoided at all other times. Sleazy politicians must take some of the blame for a low voter turnout in May. But I also suspect that the British have a worrying tendency to become intellectually lazy.

Year 9 Trip to Ypres

As the rain pelted against the windows of the bus Year 9 pupils sat inside, relieved to be visitors to the battlefields. rather than young soldiers preparing to leap into the unknown some 90 years ago. The three-day trip in February was designed to enrich the work done in History and English focusing on the causes, course and the subsequent literature of the war. The enormity of the conflict and the suffering incurred can be difficult to convey in the classroom, but is hard to avoid when standing at Tyne Cot, where 12,000 bodies lie in front of the names of 34,000 men who have no known grave. Sports Science Workshop

On Tuesday 25 March, two sports scientists from the Lucozade Sports Science team visited Cokethorpe to work with the Sixth Form Physical Education students. The annual budget for their work in sport exceeds £20 million and it was an honour to have them in School. Students attended a comprehensive lecture on sports nutrition and diet in the morning and later participated in practical speed and fitness tests. Paul Tyrer and guest runner Jack Morton to visit the grave of Lt Richard Walmesley, great great uncle of Saul Garrett (Year 9, Feilden), and to hear the story of Lt Colonel Edgar Mobbs, great great grandfather of Charlotte (Year 9, Queen Anne). As ever, Cokethorpe pupils were exemplary in their attitude towards the trip and gained a great deal from the expert guidance provided by Trevor and Bruce, the guides. It will, no doubt, be a trip that stays with them for a long time to come.



Didcot Power Station

Year 8 went on a Geography field trip to Didcot Power Station this term as part of their study of energy. Pupils watched a promotional video on electricity and then toured the site; they also visited the coal delivery area, saw the transformers and ended up in the control room and generating plant. They learnt that nut kernels from Indonesia are used in conjunction with coal as part of the government's green energy drive. It was a very enjoyable and informative visit.



(both Year 13, Gascoigne) broke the Lucozade 'YoYo' test record, by beating previous records set by educational establishments. The test involved a 55m by 20m shuttle run, with only a five second recovery period every 40m: it began with a slow speed and the tempo gradually progressed in pace until they ended in a sprint. Much was learnt during the workshop and Cokethorpe students once again demonstrated the depth of their sporting talents.

It was a delight to see them apply their knowledge by brainstorming ideas, producing marketing plans, researching costs and using ICT to design 3D products. The final of the competition was held at Milton Park, where they met Ed Vaizey MP and leading entrepreneurs. The experts gave the team feedback to help them develop their idea into a commercial reality. Look out, Dragons!

Having been involved with the Peer Educator Project, teaching groups of younger children about the effects of drugs and alcohol, he was later approached to host the Oxfordshire Youth Awards, in front of an audience of over 500 guests. Since then he has led a three-person team in applying to the government for funding. After researching activities available to young people in the area, Daniel and the OAYP applied for two grants: one aimed at giving aid to young people who are struggling financially and the other to purchase a mini bus to assist with transportation. Government and Politics Trip

On Monday 1 March the Lower Sixth Government and Politics students visited the Houses of Parliament and the new Supreme Court in Westminster. In the morning the students were given a tour of Parliament and in the afternoon they had the opportunity to sit in the Strangers' Gallery at both debating chambers and observe proceedings. In between they also had a tour of the new Supreme Court, on the western side of Parliament Square, and listened to a case in progress in the main court room. The trip was a great success and very much enjoyed by all.



General Studies

The Sixth Form General Studies programme welcomed Professor David Ferguson and Dame Jocelyn Bell-Burnell for the Lent Term's talks. Prof Ferguson, from Oxford University's Medical Sciences Division, described his work on the use of the electron microscope in biomedical research, including sub-cellular details of humans and their parasites. Suzy Russell (Upper Sixth, Swift), an A Level Biologist, found the talk particularly interesting but also stated how it had visually enhanced all the Sixth Formers' understanding of the world around them on a cellular level. Dame Bell-Burnell is a renowned award-winning astrophysicist and a self-confessed admirer of all poetry with an astrological theme. William Lawson (Upper Sixth, Gascoigne) noted how the lecture gave the audience an insight into the wonders of outer space, whilst encouraging participation as staff and Sixth Formers read out various selected verses too

Philosophy Café

This term's Philosophy Café was led by Mr Uglow, who argued that Facebook, the social networking site, is detrimental to true friendship. The Café was well attended, with many contributors from Years 10 to 13 trying to convince Mr Uglow otherwise. If You Go Down To The Woods Today...

As the audience entered The Shed they found themselves sitting in the shadowy clearing of a strange and mysterious wood. As one's eyes became accustomed to the dark, a hunched and hooded figure sat gently rocking on a tree stump, whilst three ghostly musicians, shrouded in the mist, played their sad, haunting but strangely beautiful music. A Panic arose from the feet of the figure, dancing wildly yet gracefully and then suddenly from all around, there was deafening clattering and banging on The Shed walls. It was here that the nightmare began to unfurl.

This original story, written and directed by Mrs Hooper and Mr Heaney, told of two gangs struggling to survive in a post-apocalyptic scenario. The Reapers, reveiling in the underworld, were managing to stay alive through cannibalism, while The Survivors tried to look after each other and attempted to live by their wits alone. Both however lived in fear of The Panics: dead, zombie-esque little girls who fed off the sick and the frightened. Their superbly choreographed dances were mesmerising to watch; they truly were a powerful and terrifying force.

The appearance of The Woodland Court, half-human, half-woodland creatures, was infectious and a welcome relief from the plight of the orphaned children. They brought vibrancy and colour to the stage as the audience watched their comical court cases. Amongst those present were the persistently drunk Colin Catkin, the flamboyant Mr Conker, the long-suffering Lord Chief Justice Mushroom and the wonderfully surreal Mrs Oak, whose outbursts contained prophetic warnings of the destruction ahead.

With all the disparate groups eventually coming together in the final scene, the answers to all the questions posed at the beginning of the play were answered: why did the disaster happen? Who are The Panics? Where did they come from? What was the end of the Emergency Broadcast going to say? Why are The Woodland Creatures so frightened of human children? Who is Gaia? What will happen to the children now?

This was theatre at its very best – a truly extraordinary production! The story was expertly told through a fusion of acting, music, dance, costume, lighting and sound. With over 100 pupils, contributing on and off the stage, it would be impossible to mention individual performers or crew by name. Each and every pupil involved came together to produce this magnificent performing arts ensemble.

Based on real events in Salem in 1692, the play deals with issues such as ignorance, personal integrity and courage.

Year 8 Physical Theatre

Year 8 Drama pupils explored the world of physical theatre this term. Their study of Antonin Artaud, anthropomorphism, the 'grotesque', soundscapes and tableau in class culminated in a fantastic performance of their own devising in The Shed. They produced a fast-paced and complex piece about a comically brutal game show entitled *I'm A Prisoner* – *Get Me Out Of Here* and they also treated the audience to extraordinary



machines such as the *Dream Machine* and the Party-Date-Anator. Unruly kids were given some brussel sprout treatment in the *Child Catcher 3000* and the *Re-Animator* dealt with the unfortunate issue of elderly relatives who are prone to mortality. The performance was rounded off with the brilliant exploration of a giant game of Cluedo, where the heroes were forced to roll a die in a haunted house to save their lives.




Gig Night 3

Easter Island, situated in the South Pacific, was once home to the Rapanui people and is famous not only for its spectacular 887 monumental statues, but also serves as a cautionary tale of the cultural and environmental dangers of the over-exploitation of natural resources.

History of the Houses

Feilden House is named after the Feilden family. Major Percy Feilden bought Cokethorpe House in 1908 and renovated it lavishly.

Gascoigne House takes its name from the family of the same name, which is of French origin. A Gascoigne married into the Harcourt family in 1954.

Harcourt House is named after the Harcourt family that bought the estate in 1708 and built the original Queen Anne house between 1710 and 1720.

Queen Anne House takes its name from the monarch in whose reign the current building was erected on the foundations of a Tudor manor house.

Swift House is named after Jonathan Swift, who wrote Gulliver's Travels and is known to have stayed at Cokethorpe with his friend the then Lord Harcourt.

Vanbrugh House is named after Sir John Vanbrugh, a famous architect of the early Eighteenth Century, who designed Blenheim Palace.

FUNDRAISING FOR CHARITY

Haiti Earthquake

A devastating 7.0 magnitude earthquake struck Haiti on 12 January 2010 at 4.53pm. It was the worst earthquake to hit the country in 200 years. Up to three million people live in the area worst hit by the quake, which centred 10 miles south-west of the densely populated capital Port-au-Prince. By 24 January at least 52 aftershocks, measuring 4.5 or greater, had been recorded. The latest estimates, as of 12 February, are that 230,000 people were killed, 300,000 injured and 1.2 million were left needing emergency shelter.

The world immediately responded with governments and individuals donating money to the Disaster Emergency Committee and other charities to help the Haitian people rebuild their lives. This money was used to meet the urgent need for medical care, food and water, appropriate emergency shelter and also latrines to prevent the spread of diseases. Homes, schools, health clinics and essential services such as water and sewerage needed to be replaced or provided. Haiti is the poorest country in the western hemisphere, greatly increasing the risk that people will suffer or die in the aftermath of a natural disaster.

RAPID UK

RAPID UK is an acronym for 'Rescue And Preparedness In Disasters'. It was formed in 1996 to meet the growing need for a specialist international urban search and rescue team. Their primary objective is the relief of human suffering and distress in any part of the world resulting from a disaster of any kind. This is achieved by deploying suitably trained and experienced search and rescue response teams. Within an hour of the Haiti earthquake Rapid UK had an operation team on stand-by, ready to go out as soon as flights and equipment could be organised. A four person assessment team flew out on 13 January, closely followed by five search and rescue experts.

Marie Curie Daffodil Appeal

Cokethorpe once again supported the Great Daffodil Appeal, Marie Curie Cancer Care's biggest fundraising campaign that takes place throughout March each year. This year the School raised £104.44 through the sale of daffodil badges, which turned the School yellow whilst pupils and staff showed their support of Marie Curie nurses, helping them provide high quality care in patients' own homes or in one of the charity's hospices.

Haiti Earthquake Appeal

For the Haiti Earthquake Appeal the School raised over £4,000 through a non-uniform day, parental donations and also sweet sales during a five week period. The pupils that organised these sales, contributing over £800 to the total, were Year 8 pupils Harry Lovibond (Queen Anne), Thomas Deabill (Swift), Harry Hastings (Swift), Toby Farrant (Vanbrugh) and Justin Foster (Harcourt) and also Emily Hastings (Year 7, Swift).



World Challenge

The pupils taking part in the 2011 World Challenge expedition to the Indian Himalayas have begun their fundraising efforts in earnest. One of the initiatives in February was a cake and sweet sale, organised by Year 10 pupils George Lawson (Gascoigne), Jamie Unwin (Harcourt) and James Ellacott (Feilden), which raised £120. More fundraising events will take place next term.



Langa Township Update

Last year Mr Rees visited the Langa Township near Cape Town as part of his pre-rugby tour inspection. He saw first hand some of the most distressing living conditions imaginable. As part of their effort to help the local children, pupils sold refreshments at the recent England U16 rugby matches and raised almost £150.



RAPID UK

The School was delighted to welcome one of the first British volunteers on the ground after the Haiti earthquake struck. Andy Reid, from the organisation RAPID UK, which provides experienced disaster response personnel, spoke about the effect the earthquake had on the city of Port-au-Prince, and shared some of his experiences. He used thermal imaging equipment to show students how he and his colleagues go about finding survivors.





Jewellery Sale

The jewellery-making AOB group held a jewellery sale on Friday 12 March, in advance of Mother's Day. A beautiful array of earrings, phone charms, bracelets and necklaces gave customers a difficult choice as they considered their purchases, with which they were given a free gift bag. The pupils involved were delighted and very proud to raise nearly £200, which will go to the Lesotho fund.

Kenya Aid Foundation

The Christmas boxes that the Junior School donated last term have been safely delivered and well received at the Fort Smith School in Nairobi and at the Naivasha Highway Primary School, which the Biology pupils visited last year. The charity has reported how much the pupils have enjoyed using all the items sent.

Junior School Parent Survey

In February the Foundation Office conducted a Junior School Parent Survey. On the back of a very positive Inspection Report from the ISI, in which the Junior School came out very well indeed, the Headmaster and the Head of Junior School wanted to build on this further and get a clearer picture of parents' views. An excellent 78 out of 98 families responded, their answers giving a valuable indication of the expectations and aspirations of the parents, and providing useful and actionable information to identify new opportunities, support existing plans, reaffirm how the School is seen in the eyes of the parents, and address any matters of particular concern.

The questionnaire was followed up with three discussion sessions, to which all parents were invited and 24 out of 98 families participated. The informal discussions allowed the School to gain a more detailed understanding of parent views on particular areas that were drawn from the questionnaire. The School would particularly like to thank Mrs Howard, Dr Logue and Dr Fisher, all current parents, for leading these discussions.

Celebration Dinner

Cokethorpe held a fabulous celebration dinner on Friday 12 February to mark the official opening of the new Dining Hall and Sixth Form Centre and in honour of the out-going Chairman of Governors, Michael St John Parker. Over 100 guests arrived to the impressive sound of bag pipes drifting from the new development's rooftop, before enjoying a champagne reception in the Sixth Form Common Room. Mr Ettinger and senior and long-serving members of staff were joined by current and former Governors, members of the Cokethorpe Society Committee, two former Headmasters, David Crawford and Philip Cantwell and the family of the late David Goldsmith, former Headmaster. Those that had helped in the construction of the building and representatives from a range of other companies, schools and organisations also attended. The Dining Hall looked particularly magnificent for the occasion and, following a music performance from the Schola Cantorum, the Catering Department presented a most impressive four course dinner. Following the dinner the Headmaster welcomed the guests before handing over to the new Chairman of Governors, Sir John Allison, who paid tribute to two other out-going Governors John Hunt and Tony Baker. He then invited Mr St John Parker to declare the building open by unveiling a commemorative plague. Sir John Allison made mention of many of the School's highlights that Mr St John Parker had presided over since he had joined the Governors in 1985. On behalf of all those present, and the thousands of others that had benefited from Mr St John Parker's gift of his time over a quarter of a century, Sir John thanked him for his visionary strategic leadership. Mr St John Parker brought the evening to a close with a speech which paid tribute to many people, saying it had been 'a privilege of quite staggering dimensions to be part of Cokethorpe's growth'. He referred to Cokethorpe's history up to the opening of the Dining Hall as the 'first chapter of what will become a great work', noting how the development was 'an expression in material form of what Cokethorpe is all about', and that being granted membership of the Headmasters and Headmistresses Conference (HMC), was the product of a sustained and prolonged team effort.

The Dining Hall foyer now proudly displays three oil paintings of former Cokethorpe Headmasters, Peter Allen, David Goldsmith and David Crawford. These were commissioned by Mr Ettinger and painted by former parent Louise Sturgis, a professional painter who trained at the Royal Academy in London. 

Cokethorpe Scout Group 1958

Thank you to former master Douglas Cook who recently lent his Cokethorpe Scout Group Log Book to the School. It is a handwritten account of the expedition to the Wye Valley in the summer of 1958, illustrated with hand-drawn maps and photographs. The first page begins 'Wednesday July 30th: At about half past nine a small van swung perilously out of the school gates, loaded high with rucksacks and packed inside with ten people.' The expedition was on its way. 'Thursday July 31st: The camp was roused at 7.30 by a far-too-hearty shout, "Come on you lazy campers!" Mr Hardy had arrived... We set off for Tintern at about 2pm, along the road as there were no footpaths... While having one of not infrequent rests a car drew up and proved to contain the local District Commissioner who had come in the hope of seeing us.'

More accounts of the hikes and camps follow, including visits to pubs where they were made most welcome and frequent stops for coffee and tea.



Outward Bound

Brian Horn joined Cokethorpe in the Michaelmas Term of 1961 as resident housemaster and to teach Physical Education. His particular task was to establish rugby, cricket and athletics as well as other minor sports. In the summers of 1962 and 1963 he hired a converted barn in Edale, Derbyshire to take First Years for a week's residential course. Activities included an introduction to rock-climbing, overnight camping and fieldwork involving local geography and local history. 

Sadly, all good things must come to an end and the entry for Saturday 9 August reads as follows: 'The end of a splendid holiday. We rose very early, ate a hearty breakfast and caught the bus into Bristol. At the station we all had a last cup of tea together and then Flea, Dave and Roger departed on the train, heading north: much waving and running along the platform. Feeling a bit flat, the others went back into the town for a couple of hours and then their turn came. The train for London steamed out of Bristol and the West Country settled down again to its tranquil life.



Physics Textbook

Thank you to former Physics master Charles Hansson who, on a recent visit to the School, donated a signed copy of a book he wrote whilst teaching at Cokethorpe from 1968 to 1972. Entitled Physical Data Book in SI Units it is a reference book intended for use by students of Mathematics and Physics at A Level. SI Units (the international system of units) were just being adopted as standard at the time of writing. The book includes mathematical tables and formulae for use in calculations that have been largely superseded by the use of scientific calculators, but were vital when the book was published in 1972.
