

### From the Headmaster

Churchill must be one of the most quoted people in the English language. His wartime speeches are particularly famous, not least his tribute to the pilots of the Battle of Britain - 'Never in the field of human conflict has so much been owed by so many to so few'. This year, 70 years after that fateful battle, the few are again being remembered and honoured. The anniversary is made all the more poignant at a time when British forces are once again in conflict, and almost every week we read stories of great heroism and of the death of young warriors. Our attitude to these reports has been more uncertain than that of our 1940 counterparts, because the cause for which they are fighting is less clear, less assured. Of course that's not a new sentiment. Back in 1917 Wilfred Owen wrote 'Dulce et Decorum est pro patria mori' - how sweet and noble a thing it is to die for one's country - and called it 'the old lie'.

Wars are rarely morally unambiguous, and any conflict will have its detractors, not least among conscientious pacifists. But that doesn't stop us from admiring courage, or from showing respect for those who die selflessly to protect others. Churchill was echoing Shakespeare, of course, and his Henry V at Agincourt, 'We few, we happy few, we band of brothers'. Amidst the moral morass of war we find qualities that we would be happy to see in our children as they grow up: bravery, loyalty, the abiding experience of comradeship, an instinct to cover the back of friends, the ability to face and overcome hardship...

On a lighter note, my favourite Churchill quote comes from his spat with the first ever female MP, Nancy Astor, who told him, 'Sir, if you were my husband I would put poison in your coffee'. To which he replied, 'Madam, if you were my wife I would drink it!'.

The trip was incredibly informative, centring on ISIS, the neutron and muon source used for all areas of industrial, biomedical and physics studies. The group also toured the working sites of the Vulcan and Astra lasers and met with experimental physicists who outlined the research into particle physics undertaken there.

The Rutherford staff also offered pupils the opportunity to apply for work experience placements at the site over the summer holidays. The trip was a fantastic success and the School looks forward to next year's physicists enjoying the same opportunity.'

# **ACADEMIC**

### **Trip to Paris**

In June a group of Modern Language pupils enjoyed four days in the wonderful city of Paris, where they got the opportunity to practice their French and experience a true taste of Parisian culture. They visited a number galleries, filled with some of the greatest art work ever created, and famous landmarks and monuments such as the Eiffel Tower.

### **Psychology Conference**

In June Psychology students attended a conference at the Headington Hill Campus at Oxford Brookes University. The day began with a series of talks by Brookes PhD researchers and final year students. There was then the opportunity to join small group sessions on topics such as 'How do we know what babies know' by Professor Westerman, 'Measuring mood and psychological disorders' by Dr Anna Scarna and 'Physical Attraction' by Dr Mark Burgess. The final speaker of the day was Dr Simon Green, chief examiner for AQA, who offered a wealth of tips for Sixth Form students as they embark on their A2 qualification.





### **Geography Trip to Malham Tarn**

The Year 10 geographers spent a weekend up in the Yorkshire Dales National Park in April. They used their time collecting data for their GCSE controlled assessment and looking at the effect tourism has had on Malham Tarn and its surrounds. The weather was kind to the geographers, showing the landscape at its most spectacular. They also compared U-shaped valleys caused by glaciation with V-shaped valleys caused by water, walked across the top of the famous limestone pavement and saw an ox-bow lake that most have only ever seen in text books. It was a rewarding field trip that brought geographical concepts to life.



### Foreign Office Film

Sergei Kundik (Year 7, Feilden), originally born in Russia, has made a short film which is to be used by the British Foreign and Commonwealth Office. They had launched a competition earlier in the year as a run-up to the 2012 Olympics, aimed at capturing the spirit and culture of Britain. Sergei's entry entitled 'Life in an English School', details his experience at Cokethorpe and explores what it is like to attend an independent school. Sergei was visited at Cokethorpe during the Summer Term to record a short introduction to his film in the School's grounds.



### **Lunchtime Lecture: Vehicle Sound Design**

Dr Rebecca Cain, a lecturer at Warwick University, gave a talk at Cokethorpe during the Summer Term. Dr Cain works in the laboratory that helps Jaguar and Land Rover develop the noises that their cars make. She introduced the concept of relating the sound made by popular cars to emotions that customers often attribute to them. She described how her laboratories are used and what the future may hold for the rumble of a Harley or the throaty sound of a V8 in the age of the electric engine. It was exciting to hear that there may be a time when customers can choose the sound their cars make.

### **Design Technology Project**

This term in Design and Technology Year 8 pupils made canoe paddles. Taking inspiration from tribal art they designed the blade and in May tested the success of their projects. In teams they took part in a regatta at the Cokethorpe Boat House. Each team paddled a cata-canoe, quickly discovering that communication and team work were as important as paddle design when navigating the course. The paddles proved successful with many teams building up considerable speed.



### **Writing Competition**

Congratulations to Amy Watson (Lower Sixth, Feilden), for winning the aged 11–16 category of the Deddington Writing Competition with her short story entitled, *The Green Balloon*. Daniel Pye and Fraser Logue (both Year 8, Vanbrugh) and Heidi Lawson (Year 7, Gascoigne) were also all short-listed with their short stories and poems on the given theme of 'Green'.



### **English Literary Recitals**

The English Department continued its programme of recitals this term. In May Miss Ringham's Year 10 class led a discussion asking 'Should animals have the same rights as humans?' Pupils grappled with philosophical questions such as the concept of value and worth and debated the merits of animal testing and hunting. Later in the term Miss White held a presentation titled 'Seamus Heaney - One Man and His Bog'. The audience listened to a number of Heaney's poems and explored some interesting photos of 'The Tollund Man' and 'The Grauballe Man'; both examples of the peat preserved corpses of whom Heaney was so fond.

### **Trip to BMW Factory**

In June Year 10 Design and Technology pupils visited the BMW plant in Cowley — the production site of the Mini. They received a guided tour of the museum where they saw examples of some early models of the car, including the one owned by Michael Caine's daughter, which was given to her on the set of *The Italian Job* movie.

Following this, pupils were shown around the factory floor. They saw where all the body panels are pressed and cut, where the engine is lifted into the bodywork, where the assembly of the dashboards and seats take place and the final testing and checking stations. The whole group expressed their wonder at this phenomenally impressive and complex factory, not least in learning that the current rate of production is around 800 cars a day! The huge robots were also of great interest and received a lot of attention.

### **IGCSE English**

Following the end of year examinations, Year 9 English pupils began their introduction to the internationally recognised qualification the 'International General Certificate of Secondary Education' (IGCSE). Pupils took part in a workshop on dual narratives expressed through photography. They then carried out micro-observation in groups and performed drama to express that duality.



### **Cambridge Open Day**

As accessing higher education becomes increasingly competitive it is critical that pupils develop an informed strategy for their Sixth Form and university aspirations. To this end, eight Year 11 pupils attended a two-day residential course at Queens' College, Cambridge. Pupils tasted undergraduate life by staying in the rooms in Cripps Court and attended a lecture in the Fitzpatrick Hall. Admissions tutor Dr Andrew Thompson de-bunked the common elitist myths and, with their futures in mind, pupils spoke directly to heads of departments for their respective subjects. Pupils returned to School feeling prepared for next year's application process.

### Year 7: The Witches

The Year 7 production of *The Witches* was a glorious romp into the world of bald heads, blue teeth, mice, and dog droppings! The Roald Dahl script was embellished and delivered in a contemporary way through 'Witch Watch', a news bulletin warning of the danger that witches present. Some hilarious moments meant that cast and audience enjoyed themselves immensely. Having worked hard to present a magical show with some fabulous individual characterisation and ensembles, the pupils were terrifying and humorous in equal measure.



### **GCSE: Blue Remembered Hills**

Year 10 GCSE Drama pupils have taken several assessments this year including the presentation of extracts from Dennis Potter's classic play *Blue Remembered Hills*. Set in the West Country during a summer's afternoon in 1943, the play tells the story of a group of seven-year-old children whose innocent games begin to adopt a sinister tone that ultimately ends in tragedy.

### Love's Labour's Lost

The final performance of the year took place on Prize Giving day in the Upper Quad. A combined pupil and staff production, *Love's Labour's Lost* was an hilarious interpretation of one of Shakespeare's lesser-known plays. The cast's ability to bring the verse to life and grapple with the complex wordplay was outstanding. Dressed in Mrs Mace's fantastic costumes, Louis Allen's Biron and Madeleine Allardice's Rosaline were energetic and sincere in their portrait of the bickering lovers. Guy De Vos and Lucy Grout performed with an authority that belied their years and were



### Year 8: Mythipedia

Mythipedia was a culmination of a year's hard work exploring the possibilities of physical theatre and the wide scope of the imagination. Adapted from original scripts by the pupils, four short plays covered classical tales from Ancient Greece with irreverent humour and minimal props. The cast worked hard to create the sounds, sets and atmosphere using complex tableaux and mime to great effect. Memorable characters included the superstar Theseus, flying Perseus, tetchy Poseidon, street-wise Nymphs, the dim-witted Cyclops family and a cheerleading Chorus.





supported by Miles Beirouti and Brian Clarke as the impetuous students Dumain and Longavalle. The rustic comics, Costard, Moth and Jacquenetta (Thomas De Vos, Daniel McCall and Rosie Turner) were superbly anarchic and magnificently led by George Lawson as the ludicrous Armado. Mr Williams provided a flamboyant Boyet, Mr Walwyn a Geordie Dull, and Mr Lawson a cameo as Mercade. Mrs Hooper and Miss Ringham perhaps stole the show with their grotesque interpretations of Katherine and Maria. Mr Heaney's music throughout completed the experience.



### Lower Sixth: A Clockwork Orange

The Lower Sixth Theatre Studies students performed their ensemble piece as part of their AS Level assessment in front of examiners on 27 May. A Clockwork Orange may have seemed a risky choice - robbery, gang violence, murder and rape being the order of the day - however, it certainly paid off. All but one cast member played a multitude of roles, changing costumes in front of the audience in true Brechtian style. Edd Bird played the charismatic anti-hero Alex with the right amount of arrogance and menace, yet he also brought humour and charm to the role. Zoë Cantley was not only a terrifying Droog, but played a variety of diverse roles including the ethereal Doctor Branom. James Metcalfe played his six roles proficiently, his Old Woman being one of the most memorable; James's

comic timing and portrayal of the mad, cat-loving pensioner raised plenty of uncomfortable laughs, as did his effeminate, euphoric Hospital Orderly. The Chaplain, played by Luke Saunders, struggled to set Alex on the path to righteousness and find the answers to questions such as 'What does God want?' Guy De Vos made a convincing Mother, shuffling around in housecoat and hair-rollers, oblivious to her son's dreadful misdemeanours. His portrayal of Doctor Brodsky was weighty and authoritative and his inept policeman was portrayed excellently. Alexander Lawson also played six roles, including the eccentric probation officer Deltoid and the academically challenged Dim. Meanwhile Peter Small's lighting design was stunning, adding the right mood and providing brilliant contrasts.







### **Upper Sixth: Long Grove Asylum**

Upper Sixth Theatre Studies candidates presented Long Grove Asylum - Lost Lives during April. This original devised drama was based on research about the disturbing incarceration of women in mental institutions in the 1950s. Set in Long Grove Asylum, the stories of three patients were told through a variety of techniques and styles. The audience learnt about their tragic pasts and the appalling treatment they were subjected to. Nancy Jones (Bronté Coppock-Cudd) was admitted at the age of 16 due to a 'nervous disposition', Ethel Jenkins (Jessica O'Brien) was incarcerated by her husband when she attempted to escape a life of domestic violence, while Barbara Marling (Olivia Plummer) was one of many women committed to

institutions suffering from typhoid. These women, deemed unfit to return to society, were forced to live out the rest of their days inside asylums. The staff (Chloë Pickford and Sian Keegan) had little training or understanding of mental health issues and kept the patients 'gentle and submissive' through heavy sedation, electro-convulsive therapy and brutal lobotomies. The accompanying soundtrack took the audience through the 1950s to the late 1980s, when many of these institutions were finally closed. Despite the gravity of the subject matter, there were some comic moments with sharply choreographed rituals of 'medication time' and an excellent 'tooth brushing' scene. This was a deeply moving and powerful piece of theatre.

### **Kayaking**

Cokethorpe put in another formidable performance at this year's Devizes to Westminster race. Former pupils Tim Muller and Fred Reif (both 2009, Vanbrugh) won the Junior Doubles class for the third year running, completing the 125 gruelling miles over 4 days, in 15 hours 39 minutes. Former pupil Callum Staff (2009, Gascoigne), partnered by a member of the Devizes Canoe Club, came fifth and George Barnicoat (Year 11, Harcourt) and Louis Allen (Year 10, Harcourt) came ninth with a time of 18 hours 32 minutes. Louis Taylor (Year 11, Feilden) and Philip Marmon (Year 11, Swift) came 16th and Elliott Kratt (Year 11, Gascoigne) and Isaac Staff (Year 10, Gascoigne) came 21st, with Jack Bennett (Year 11, Feilden) and Gregory Muller (Year 11, Vanbrugh) coming a very respectable 27th.

These positions combined meant that Cokethorpe finished an excellent first overall in the team standings, out of 73 finishing pairs (77 starting).



### **Sports Awards Dinner**

The first whole School Sports Awards Dinner took place on the evening of Friday 28 May. In the company of guest speaker Mr Peter Rhoades-Brown, Oxford United's Community Football Officer, nearly 100 pupils and staff enjoyed a wonderful meal followed by the presentation of nineteen awards to this year's outstanding sports performers. Over seventy pupils have also represented the School this year at county level or beyond and this goes hand in hand with national wins in clays and kayaking, successes in regional hockey and county rugby triumphs at U18 and U15 levels.



### **Clay Pigeon Shooting**

The British Schools' Clay Pigeon Shooting Championships were this year held in Buckinghamshire and attracted over 300 competitors from all over the UK. Cokethorpe were under considerable pressure to retain the trophy, however, three months of intensive practice paid off as, after an extraordinarily consistent performance from every team member, Cokethorpe again took the title by a considerable margin. At an individual level, Cokethorpe's George Kerr (Year 12, Feilden) took second high gun, with Jordan Gillies (Upper Sixth, Feilden) fourth and Andrew Fiedorowicz (Year 9, Vanbrugh) and Matthew Barkham (Year 10, Feilden) tying for fifth.

Amongst 32 teams from schools and cadets, 1st place for Cokethorpe was particularly gratifying, as they again beat some of the best shooting schools in the UK including Millfield, Warwick, Stowe, Harrow, Bloxham, Rugby, KES, Rendcomb College and The Oratory.



### **Karate**

Congratulations to Daniel McCall (Year 10, Vanbrugh) on his recent success at the International Open Karate Championships. Daniel achieved Bronze in the team event and also came runner up in the individual U17 competition. He had been on target to take Gold right up until 7 seconds from the end of the bout, when the other competitor equalised and then scored first in a sudden death play-off. The winner is fighting in Brazil for England later this year, indicating the weight of Daniel's achievement. At the end of the tournament Daniel was asked by the head coach to fight for England in Romania this September.

(Year 11, Gascoigne) won six events placing them second. All the athletes deserve praise for conducting themselves in such an outstanding manner. Also in athletics this term the School was proud to have three of its pupils, Frederick Curtis, Redford Curtis and Jacob Wilson, selected to represent Oxfordshire at the English Schools' Athletic Championships. Selection was highly competitive and only 25 athletes were chosen from within each county. Jacob Wilson has also been given the honour of captaining Oxfordshire.



### Rounders

2010 has been a very successful year for Cokethorpe's rounders teams, with the School producing some of their best results to date. The seniors won a large proportion of their fixtures, while the U15s, led by Hope Boyd (Queen Anne), had another successful season, winning all but one fixture. The U14s had notable successes including wins against Pangbourne and Headington; Lydia McCall (Vanbrugh) proved to be not only an excellent captain, but a strong competitor. The U13s improved significantly and racked up impressive wins against The Dragon, Cranford House and Bloxham.

It was the U12 team, and their captain Megan Bird (Harcourt), however, who was crowned team of the season for their string of successes. In their match against Bloxham, Cokethorpe fielded tightly and batted outstandingly, smashing balls to all corners of the grounds to win 35-16.





### Cricket

Cokethorpe have enjoyed a successful season with the School winning over 60% of their matches. The 1st XI produced their best performance against South Oxford Amateurs, with Philip Allen (Gascoigne) making an impressive unbeaten century and Billy Webb (Gascoigne) scoring 90. Both boys also took three wickets to secure a victory.

The U15 side struggled to make an impact this year with a small group of players. However, the U14 side certainly showed its talent and potential for the future with strong wins over Bloxham School and Pangbourne College.

The Lower School players also enjoyed a very successful season: the U13s lost only twice, one occasion being in the County Cup semi-final. The U12s also conceded just two matches, again one of which was in the County Cup, this time in the final against a formidable Abingdon team.

# FROM THE ARCHIVES

### **Turning Back the Pages**

Below are some news items chosen from past issues of *The Bell Tower* and *The Peacock*.

### 10 Years Ago

- Members of Year 9 competed in the National Poetry Slam held at the Cheltenham Everyman's Theatre.
   The competition was filmed by the sponsor Telewest. Two Cokethorpe pupils made it through to the final
- The Junior Department launched two collections for their modern day harvest. The children collected art materials for the activity room of Martin House in Yorkshire – a respite care centre for seriously ill children and their families. The second collection involved collecting all types of foreign currency to aid the children of Guatemala City Dump

### 25 Years Ago

- Miss Grace Hamblin OBE, who for many years was secretary to Sir Winston Churchill, came to talk to a Third Form History set. After Sir Winston's death Miss Hamblin became the first Administrator of Chartwell when it was handed over to the National Trust
- The project to replace the entire roof of the Mansion House began in May. The total estimated cost of the whole project was £250,000, of which English Heritage contributed nearly 40%. The wooden framework of the roof has altered very little since its construction in 1709. Close inspection of some of this material shows that a lot of the wood used in the original roof was second-hand even in 1700

### 30 Years Ago

 As part of the General Studies programme Lady Antonia Fraser gave a talk entitled 'A biographer in search of a subject'. When asked 'If you had been alive in Charles II's time do you think you would have been attracted to him?' she answered 'I am quite sure I would and hope he would have been attracted to me. With all those other ladies around it would have been dreadful to have been left out!'

### 35 Years Ago

 The Canoe Club organised a long-distance paddle which raised £190 and enabled them to purchase four canoes and equipment necessary to start the club off

### 45 Years Ago

 The metric system was introduced in athletics. The adoption of the system resulted in the creation of a series of new School records which were steadily improved upon throughout the season

### The History of Computing

The first computer arrived at Cokethorpe in 1983 courtesy of Nicholas Berg (1980, Queen Anne), who brought a Nascom computer kit (pictured below left), and assembled it in the Physics laboratory. Such was the interest in computers that a Computer Club was soon established. There was one computer – a Commodore PET (pictured below middle); with 4k of RAM, a built-in 9" screen and a built-in cassette drive for storage, it was considered state of the art at the time. In 1984 the club welcomed two BBC Model B computers (pictured below right). They were described as 'highly advanced with a total of 64k memory, of which 25k (approximately enough to contain 4,000 words) is used for programming. The BBC has 16 colours, a four channel music synthesiser and high resolution graphics. Each BBC computer has a

disc drive and video output; one a black and white television which is used for programming and the other a large colour monitor which is used for showing programmes to classes'. Four more BBC Model Bs were ordered the following year and thereafter computing became an academic subject, offered as a Fourth Form 'O' Level option. In 1986 word processing was introduced and the Bursar reported: 'On the home front the Bursary is now sporting a computer that not only produces the bills faster than my secretary (if that is possible), but also provides information that is helpful in the general administration of the School'. A wish for a modem was expressed in 1987 which would enable pupils 'to talk to the rest of the world, a facility that will be particularly useful for GCSE. The computer world at Cokethorpe will then be more than just enjoyable!'.







### **Land Girls at Cokethorpe**

The Women's Land Army was started in 1939: with war seen as imminent the government realised the need for more food to be grown in Britain and with six million men away at war, women were encouraged to go and work on farms. Cokethorpe housed various so called land girls from 1939 who worked on local farms and at Ditchley Park near Woodstock. Two such land girls, Yvonne Godfrey and Joyce Pimm came to Cokethorpe to talk to Year 4 about their experiences this term. Yvonne had been billeted at Cokethorpe and this was her first time back in over 60 years! She was delighted to see her old bedroom - now a Junior School classroom - and she and Joyce, who had been billeted nearby, gave the children in Year 4 an insight into their experiences



### **Additions to the Archive**

The School has been fortunate in acquiring an antique Staffordshire four piece blue and white tureen which is thought to date from 1835. Clearly recognisable, Cokethorpe Park is depicted on the saucer of the tureen and the words 'Cokethorpe Park Oxfordshire' are written on the bottom of the saucer.

A large leather-bound bible, measuring 18.5" by 12.5" has also recently been unearthed. The bible, which has over 1600 pages and dates back to 1822, belonged to the Cokethorpe Chapel.

Thank you to Mark Girling (1977, Harcourt) for donating a copy of the 1974 whole School photograph to the Cokethorpe Archives. This had been one of the years which were missing.
