From the Headmaster

Overheard on a London bus:

First Woman: 'I don't know what to get Fred for his birthday.'

Second Woman: 'Why don't you get him a book?'

First Woman: (after a moment's thought) 'Nah, he's already got a book.'

Though borrowed from the French, the term 'anecdote' ultimately derives from a nearly identical Greek word (anekdota) meaning 'things not given out.' And yet anecdotes are the stuff of weekly assemblies, a chance for headmasters to impart wisdom and thought... well, that's the hope! It is through the simple anecdote that much of the human condition can be teased out and amplified. Disraeli called anecdotes: 'minute notices of human nature and of human learning.' A good anecdote is often a mini-drama that helps us to reflect on our own lives as we peek into the lives of others.

Classical anecdotes typically embodied ancient wisdom or philosophical insight as when Diogenes explained to Alexander the Great why he was examining a heap of human bones: 'I am searching for the bones of your father, but I cannot distinguish them from those of his slaves.' But there is a note of warning. It has been said that '... if the information glut can be likened to the danger of eating too much, anecdotage is like scarfing down too many sweets. It is a short cut to quick pleasure and short term satisfaction but ultimately it can be unfulfilling, and even dangerous - empty calories that can disturb a nutritious regimen.' Headmasters be aware!

'Some of the best questions I've ever been asked by secondary school students' was the reaction from David Calcutt after his visit to Cokethorpe to work with the Lower First pupils. The playwright, who has also written three acclaimed novels, used his visit to dramatise different sections of his play Troy 24, and to discuss how it was developed. A full house in the Cranham Library also enjoyed a lunchtime Q&A session, with questions on topics such as his inspiration and his recently completed new novel.





English Literary Recitals

Three lunchtime literary recitals took place over the course of the Lent Term. Mrs Howells was first to take the floor as she read the work of some of her favourite contemporary poets. This was followed by a thought-provoking and inspirational recital on 'Positive Suffering' from Mr White. Fourth Form pupils then concluded the programme with an analysis of pieces from their examination anthology. The group demonstrated how each extract sought to articulate the boundaries of human experience.



Philosophy Café
The Lent Term's Philosophy Café was led by Head of Philosophy, Mr Schofield, who posed the question 'Was Robin Hood right to steal from the rich to give to the poor?'. Rather than an ideological argument for redistribution, evidence was presented from a recent work of social epidemiology, The Spirit Level. Its authors demonstrate a strong correlation between economic inequality and social problems, thereby providing statistical support for Robin Hood's intention, if not his methods. As usual, a lively and informal debate amongst pupils and staff took place, as they explored the arguments for and against greater equality in the United Kingdom. The traditional show of hands at the end of the debate showed a balance of sentiment towards the issue.



HE and Careers Fair

Pupils from the Third Form upwards and their parents filled the Sports Hall for the Higher Education and Careers Fair in March. The wide range of educational institutions and professions being represented provided pupils with the chance to see the scale of opportunity open to them and to get advice from experts in different fields. If pupils wanted to know how to shape a career in sculpting screenplays, splitting atoms or calming a panic in a prison, to mention a few, this fair was full of practical advice. 년



History Trip to Ypres



Gap Year Talk

Two former pupils, James Nettlefold (Swift) and Jordan Gillies (Feilden), who left School in 2010, came back to Cokethorpe in April to talk to current Sixth Form students about their Gap Year experience. The two boys, along with Morgan Wigham (OC 2010, Vanbrugh) spent time in Nairobi in January, where they taught in Bethel School in Kibera, one of the largest slums in the world. During the lecture, which took place in The Shed, James and Jordan described how 1.7 million people live in Kibera with no running water, electricity or a sewage system. They also talked about their experience of teaching which, they told the Sixth Formers, was at times very daunting.

The Sixth Form, many of whom are starting to think about their own plans for after they leave School, found the lecture from their peers a fantastic opportunity to hear about other students' Gap Year experiences.

Wine Tasting Evening

In February 60 members of the Sixth Form were privileged to enjoy an illuminating wine tasting evening, led by Ted Sandbach from the Oxford Wine Company. Students tasted a variety of white and red wines. from a Riesling to a Rioja, and the evening culminated in a tasting competition with two mystery wines. Politics Trip to Washington DC and New York

2011 has seen the first major sign that Barack Obama's future in the White House may be in doubt and in February 30 Sixth Form students went to assess the situation for themselves.


The first stop was Washington where the group took in each of the major institutions of the Federal Government and were lucky to be able to tour the White House – a rare opportunity post 9/11. They had a guided tour of Congress and visits were also made to the National Archives to see the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. A highlight of the time spent in Washington was ascending the Washington Monument for unrivalled views right across the capital. Students also spent time in the Library of Congress. visited the National Memorials, and travelled out to the Arlington Cemetery. Washington DC is not all about academia though, and students watched the Washington Wizards battle it out against the Indiana Pacers at the Verizon Centre.

Next they travelled to New York where they visited Brooklyn, had a guided tour of the UN Headquarters, as well as visiting key sights such as the Statue of Liberty, Grand Central Station, and Ground Zero. A particular highlight of their time in the metropolis was walking through Times Square at night en route to seeing Chicago on Broadway. On the last day the group took a morning stroll through Central Park and ascended the Empire State Building for more fantastic views across the Big Apple. The trip was a tremendous success - engaging in the political, historical and cultural mix that represents the United States of America.

General Studies Lectures

Baroness d'Souza, a crossbencher in the House of Lords, gave an insightful talk to Cokethorpe's Sixth Form students as part of the General Studies programme on Friday 18 February. Her captivating lecture gripped Sixth Form students and the many staff also in attendance. She demystified what the House of Lords is, why we have it, and moreover why we still need it to keep the government in check. The timing of the talk was well placed, with the School's A Level Politics students about to embark on a trip to Washington DC over half term. The triple round of applause certainly confirmed the students' appreciation of her wide-ranging and fascinating address. ៤

Equally fascinating was Peter Mulligan's deftly illustrated General Studies presentation in March, in which he addressed the UK's disaster planning policy. Peter outlined how current disaster planning is rooted in sources as diverse as ancient Chinese military strategy and Caesar's critical Gaul campaign. Drawing from his Masters degree and his work in government, Peter depicted how theory has been exercised recently: Tokyo's sarin gas attack, the Buncefield oil disaster and the fractures in the Nuclear Club. Peter's analysis concluded with the present threats to our nation, from Al-Qaeda to pandemics, and our capability to respond.

Particle Physics Masterclass

Sixth Form students joined 28 other schools to take part in a Particle Physics Masterclass at Rutherford Appleton Laboratory (RAL) on Thursday 17 March. During the session, designed to inspire students to go on to take up careers in science and technology, students took part in a computer-based workshop using real data from the large Hadron Collider (the world's most powerful particle accelerator), at CERN. They also attended lectures by particle physicists from RAL and CERN and went on tours of some of the key facilities on site, including the Diamond synchrotron (a machine designed to produce very intense beams of x-rays, infrared and ultraviolet light). The trip was a great success and gave students first-hand understanding of what a career in science or technology may involve.







Warwick Debating Competition

'Four Lower Sixth students competed against 25 other schools in the University of Warwick's Schools' Debating Competition on Saturday 22 January. Gabriel Gavin (Queen Anne), Alex Bryson (Harcourt), Jacob Booty (Swift) and Jack Cully (Feilden), took part in four debates ranging from the role of trade unions and the NHS, to that of TV advertising companies and a hypothetical superhero. The British Parliamentary format gave each team the opportunity to present arguments from all four of the positions on 'the table'. Fauré's Requiem

Whilst other Nineteenth Century settings of the Requiem Mass often relish the dramatic representation of the day of judgement, Fauré's *Requiem* instead focuses on the idea of salvation, and the journey into Paradise. Many whom are not familiar with Fauré's work may at least remember the Berceuse from his *Dolly Suite*, which was used as the theme tune to the BBC radio programme *Listen With Mother* for many years. In spite of the small scale of the majority of his output, Fauré left a significant impression on the musical world.

The Requiem is one of his few large-scale pieces, but in many sections Fauré uses an intimate sound reminiscent of his songs and piano pieces. Fauré knew Saint-Saëns, Liszt and Wagner, but his more delicate music heralded the development of a new French musical style.

Lunchtime Music Recitals

The term got underway with a piano recital by William Cowley (Lower First, Swift), Eloise Fraser-Paterson (Lower First, Queen Anne) and Fraser Logue (Third Form, Vanbrugh). Having just passed their grade 2, 3 and 4 exams respectively, they enjoyed sharing their pieces with an appreciative audience. The second recital was opened by Yukiko Nishikawa (Year 6, Gascoigne) who performed two solo pieces on piano. Melanie Severn (Third Form, Gascoigne), Katherine Woolley (Fourth Form, Queen Anne) and Ellen Garbutt (Third Form, Feilden) then treated the audience to the *Pie Jesu* from Faure's *Requiem*. Finally, Upper Sixth musicians, Paul Berry (Queen Anne), Edd Bird (Gascoigne), William Draper (Harcourt), Freddie Miles (Gascoigne) and Luke Saunders (Feilden) performed selections from *Les Miserables*. Rounding up the term, Fourth Form pupils held a by-invitation-only recital and lunch. Senior School Production: Pirates of Penzance

By Gilbert & Sullivan

In keeping with previous years, a talented cast and crew worked brilliantly together to create a spectacular sold-out three-night run of *The Pirates of Penzance* at the end of the term. During the months of preparation, pupils worked alongside an already busy School calendar to put in the many hours of practice required. This was an unusually difficult piece to learn, compounded perversely maybe by how very well known 'Pirates' is, but the complex story was presented impressively coherently.

The opening night was a triumph and the show only got better with each performance. The expertly designed and handled lighting lit up another imaginative set and showed off the highly talented scene designers and costume makers who worked up to the last minute to ensure a visual feast for the sell out audiences. What really made this production completely different to any before it, and possibly unlike any other G&S production, was the intricately choreographed and meticulous dance routine that opened each performance.







For this, a large dance troupe, working to a specially-arranged Overture, put together a wonderful and exciting piece of contemporary dance. This included three highly co-ordinated sections with a beautiful piece of ballet performed *en pointe* by Fourth Form pupils Connie Manning (Swift), Rosie Turner (Feilden) and Anna Withey (Harcourt) and a breath-taking duo of break-dance and body-popping from Sam Coles (Lower First, Swift) and Ben Tracey (Upper First, Vanbrugh).


All in all the pupils achieved a level of professionalism very rarely seen in schools. The maidens were elegant and refined; the pirates perfectly rowdy and the police outrageously comical. The lead cast members carried the whole event to heights never before achieved

at Cokethorpe, each one working incredibly hard to ensure their roles, and those of other cast members around them, were delivered not just convincingly but with command and close attention to detail.

The nature of this production meant that the staff felt the casting process allowed everyone who showed a real interest to be involved from the outset; and this certainly paid off well. A DVD in due course will provide lasting evidence to support the supremely excellent reviews received.









Third Form: Missing

This term the Third Form pupils have been working on an assignment in Drama dealing with the issues of why people run away and the experiences of becoming homeless. Working in small groups, pupils devised pieces dealing with real-life cases. This project produced some excellent, thought-provoking and sensitive performances.

Lower First: Soap Operas

Lower First pupils were set a challenging task during the first half of the term, to write, direct, perform and produce their own original soap operas. As well as providing pupils with the freedom to make their own creative choices, the project tested their skills in cooperation, listening, negotiation, teamwork and decision making. Each episode was filmed and the pupils evaluated their work and the work of others.



A Level: Letters Home

The A2 Theatre Studies students presented their final performance piece on Tuesday 15 March. Based on the stimulus 'letters home', Zoë Cantley and Luke Saunders (both Feilden), Alexander Lawson (Swift) and Edd Bird (Gascoigne), with Peter Small (Swift) providing the lighting and sound, devised a powerful and emotive piece of original theatre. Set in an isolated, imaginary world of the postal sorting office the employees go about their daily tasks. However, despite the comic characterisations, there was always a sense of foreboding. When a box containing items belonging to a child evacuee is dropped, the mood changed immediately. The lighting and music created an eerie atmosphere as the workers took on the life and characters from the child's letters to his mother. The scene transitions took the audience in and out of the sorting office by use of certain dramatic triggers. There were far too many wonderful moments in this production to mention them all but, suffice to say, this was a truly outstanding and mature creation which was beautifully acted and designed.

Soccer

The Senior School soccer squads won or drew 48 of the 71 fixtures this term, taking victory in just over 62% of their matches. At the end of the season, it is the U12s who stole the limelight, having won in all of their nine fixtures, which is a great achievement. The 1st XI won and drew more games than they lost, which is promising given that the side will by and large be the same next year and so the building blocks are in place. The side has been well led by captain Alexander Cade (Lower Sixth, Swift), who has never given anything other than his best both on and off the field.

Netball

The netballers have produced the most successful season seen in recent years, not only illustrated by the calibre of the players now in the top end of the School, but seen from an improvement from all teams. The fixture list has been strengthened and the School is now challenging the top netball schools in the county. Some memorable moments have been the 1st VII who defeated Oxford High and Stowe, and the U12s who came third in the county tournament out of 16 teams. The U12s were also awarded team of the season for losing only two of their 11 fixtures.



Hockey

The boys' debut season in hockey was very successful, winning six, drawing one and losing just two of their nine fixtures. The term started slowly with a loss to a strong Warwick side, as the boys adjusted to playing as a team. However, many positives were taken from the game and they soon started to play with fluidity. The climax came against an organised Abingdon side where Cokethorpe dug in and won 1-0 through resilient defending and quick counter-attacking. Having had a great first season, establishing Cokethorpe as a credible force in boys' hockey, it is hoped this will be built on next year to give more boys the opportunity to represent the School in this sport. Lloyd Cadman (Lower Sixth, Harcourt) deserves credit not only for being top goal scorer (ten in total), but for the way he has played and organised the team. Hugo Van Dorssen (Lower Sixth, Vanbrugh) was awarded player of the season for his performances as goalkeeper.

On Thursday 17 March the U12 hockey girls were victorious in the County Tournament held at Cokethorpe. They started with a tough game against Headington, drawing 1–1 after Lulu Allen (Gascoigne) levelled the score in the second half. Cokethorpe beat Oxford High by a comfortable 3 goals, with Anya Duffy (Queen Anne), Elisha Evans (Swift) and LuisaMae Lisi (Vanbrugh) all scoring. Finally, the team came up against a determined Tudor Hall side and despite a number of close chances Cokethorpe only managed to hit the net once, finishing with a clean strike from Elisha Evans.

The 1st XI took part in the Cokethorpe Rugby Sevens and Hockey Festival on Saturday 19 March and performed consistently well to take victory. On Tuesday 5 April the U13 boys took part in the West Oxfordshire Hockey Tournament at Wood Green School and were crowned champions following a successful campaign.



Rugby

Cokethorpe 1st XV players were crowned champions for the third year running following an 8-7 win against a committed and physical Henley College side in their rearranged U19 County Cup final in January. Particular mention goes to Sophie Wheeler (Year 5, Lockwood) who blitzed the field to take gold in her U10 race, and to the U10 girls' team as a whole, who finished runners up to The Manor Preparatory School by a narrow margin. The U10 boys' team also took the silver, beating amongst others Akeley Wood, Abingdon Prep, The Dragon and the hosts Chandlings.

On Tuesday 8 March, 14 children took part in an event at The Manor Preparatory School. This group will undertake a further practice expedition at the end of April before both groups complete their final assessment expedition in July.



Seven hundred and sixty five children played in 250 games on three pitches over two days in what has become one of the UK's largest festivals of junior hockey, hosted by Rover Oxford at Cokethorpe School and Witney ATP. The fast and furious action had a truly international atmosphere with teams travelling from Banbridge Academy, Northern Ireland and Basko from Veldhoven in the Netherlands. The event is also used by Oxfordshire umpires to help train and develop umpires in a friendly but competitive spirit.

The U8's tournament started the weekend, with some energetic work from the youngest competitors. This was followed by the mixed U10s and U12s boys, where the tempo increased with some really fluent play from all the sides. On a second blistering day of the festival, spectators enjoyed junior hockey to match the weather. Witney ATP hosted the U12s and U14 girls' competitions, with the umpire's 'Fair Play' award going to Cokethorpe's U12 girls. Over at Cokethorpe, the U14 boys' tournament proved as popular as ever, followed by the U16 girls (winners Oxford Hawks pictured below) and a hugely competitive U16 boys tournament. The Headmaster, Mr Ettinger, presented prizes to the winning teams on Sunday.



Wider Community

Parents' Information Evening

Nine visiting speakers took part in the School's first Parents' Information Evening on Tuesday 8 February, designed to offer advice to parents on the potential problems encountered by teenagers. With over 150 parents in attendance, the seminars covered areas such as drugs education, sexual health, social networking and eating disorders. Although the talks were brief, they raised many questions and provoked a great deal of thought, not least concerning the level of support given to our children in these difficult times. Most of the talks were age specific and many aspects are covered during the academic year in PSHE. The School is grateful to the parents for supporting this new venture and the feedback received suggests that the evening was a success and worthy of repeating. ☑



University Research Project

On Friday 25 March over 30 girls from Fourth Form to Upper Sixth, took part in a research study exploring how girls and young women being educated in the independent sector understand and experience their worlds. Claire Maxwell from the Institute of Education, University of London, led the investigation which is being funded by the UK Economic and Social Research Council. The girls that volunteered spent an hour with Ms Maxwell discussing their experiences of Cokethorpe, what their expectations are for the rest of their schooling and beyond, the people they admire and what they are passionate about. The girls that participated reported that they enjoyed the opportunity to talk about and reflect on their own lives.

Admissions Round-Up

Lent Term is traditionally the busiest term for the Admissions Office. A Junior School Assessment Day was on Thursday 27 January and the Lower First Assessment and Activities Day on Saturday 29 January, which was preceded by candidate interviews. Open Morning on Saturday 12 February was another busy and successful day and the Lower First, Third Form and Sixth Form Scholarship Assessments also took place.

Oxfordshire Science Festival: Trebuchet Competition

On Sunday 20 March, Cokethorpe again hosted a Trebuchet Competition as part of the Oxfordshire Science Festival. Two teams of apprentice engineers from Culham and Rutherford laboratories, working with Third and Fourth Form Cokethorpe pupils, designed and built large trebuchets to compete. This provided the pupils with a fantastic opportunity to gain valuable experience of applying knowledge learnt in Physics, Mathematics and Design and Technology to a real life challenge. On the day, the winning trebuchet (Cokethorpe/Rutherford) fired a water balloon 43m, just beating the Cokethorpe/Culham team by two metres; both teams beat last year's record. On the same day, members of the public and Cokethorpe pupils enjoyed building mini-trebuchets from garden canes, tea strainers and twine. The winning team sent a water balloon an impressive 26m. Other events included marshmallow and spaghetti structure building, constructing circuits, periscopes and experiments on splitting light, which enabled a number of Cub Scouts to gain their Scientist badge. Overall, over a hundred children and adults enjoyed this hands-on science day.

From the Archives

Turning Back the Pages

Below are news items from past issues of *The Bell Tower* and *The Peacock*.

10 Years Ago (2001)

A group of Year 7 pupils attempted to recreate the 3 Peaks Challenge by climbing the Cokethorpe climbing wall a total of 429 times. The climbers were sponsored as part of the Year 7 Charity Day in aid of LEPRA.

15 Years Ago (1996)

Cokethorpe continued its tradition of raising money for charity by running activities in support of Red Nose Day. Attractions included a penalty shootout, car washing, a lemonade stall and buskers with the sporting highlight being a boys versus girls hockey match – won by the boys.

20 Years Ago (1991)

For the first time in 51 years
Mrs Winterbourne and Mrs Jones visited
Cokethorpe where they had been
parlour maids long before Cokethorpe
became a school. When they lived here
they were housed on the top floor where
they were expected to be silent. During
the hot weather the parlour maids would
sleep on the balcony on mattresses.

25 Years Ago (1986)

On Sunday 8 June a Cokethorpe Celebrity Cricket Match – Colin Cowdrey's Cokethorpe XI v Colin Milburn's Scat's XI – and Family Fun Day was held at the School. The proceeds were divided between Somerset Court Autistic Trust and the Cokethorpe Building Appeal. Many celebrities attended.

30 Years Ago (1981)

Roald Dahl came to give a talk as part of the General Studies programme. He pointed out that many writers had initially been teachers: 'Among your staff there may be a future D H Lawrence or a Sartre – and you can't tell which, so you might as well be polite to them all!'.

35 Years Ago (1976)

The School acquired a refracting telescope with magnifications of up to 240. Many pupils have seen the Moon's surface in detail from a makeshift observatory on the Sixth Form balcony.

40 Years Ago (1971)

The Astronomy Club started in 1969 and ever since we have had a good membership drawn from the most junior to the most senior forms. During the past year we were lucky enough to be invited to meetings of the Astronomy Club at the Royal Military College of Science.

45 Years Ago (1966)

In the light of this year's debates it seems that while this House is sure that the Moon is a bore and equally sure of its belief in Father Christmas, it is by no means convinced that the pen is mightier than the sword.

Donations to the Archives

We are very grateful to Thomas Vesely (OC 1960, Swift) who sent in some papers recently found in his father's loft. Included in the papers are clothing lists from 1958 and a note to parents stating that a regulation sports coat was to be introduced: 'in a specific shade of Harris tweed... the price of this sports coat will vary from £6.12s.6d to £7.17s.6d depending on the size'. A term's fees in 1959 were £89.5s, with extras added for laundry, Chapel, text books and medical fees.

The 1958 text book list also makes interesting reading. Along with the customary Shakespeare, W H Davies's *The Autobiography of a Super-Tramp* and Robert Louis Stevenson's *Treasure Island* and *Kidnapped* were also on the list. Other documents in the collection entitled 'Some Customs of the House' and 'Some Practical Points Based on the Customs' encourage boys to have 'A proper pride in one's clothes and person', to be tidy – 'General tidiness of person and surroundings is a positive virtue' and 'the discipline of work is necessary for all of us'.

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Before the Web Was Born

When Cokethorpe was founded, prospectuses, newsletters and magazines were the School's main form of advertising. Early versions provided the bare information across just a few pages, with no photographs. Today the School website is often the first port of call for prospective parents wishing to find out about the School.

Long before Tim Berners-Lee developed the World Wide Web at Cerne in 1990, however, the forward-thinking editor of *The Peacock* magazine in 1966 dreamt of information being made available by 'the machine'. In one of his introductions he stated that 'Our readership is domestic; we print such things as may interest boys, Old Boys, parents; strangers are beyond our scope. For the stranger, a medium is needed more up-to-date than the School magazine; a library of tape recordings for instance would be just the thing. What a thrilling prospect when (thanks to the machine) the real unvarnished truth about the School is made available to all! Fancy the headmaster playing a selection of these tapes to a prospective parent!'. The editor went on to say 'Boys know everything, as a matter of course; Old Boys can remember; parents are enlightened by the revelations of their sons. These readers can supply the unrecorded facts, and fill in the gaps; to them, until the day of talking magazines, we dedicate these pages'.

'These pages' of *The Peacock* have recently been digitalised and are now available on the School website; as is Steven Pudney's film of Speech Day 1968, which has been attracting large numbers of viewers: 366 so far!




Cokethorpe Society Football and Netball Matches

The Society would like to pay tribute to OC Andrew Forbes who the School learnt had died in 2006. Andrew attended Cokethorpe from 1964–1968.


Margaret Bowsher
