From the Headmaster

A much quoted phrase of historians suggests that those who do not learn from history are condemned to repeat it. The recent events in Crimea have historical echoes that should perhaps give us pause for such a reflection.

Some parallels come immediately to mind. The last time Britain was involved in a direct war against Russia was in fact in Crimea, which has long been considered strategically very important; a place where East and West meet. In the mid-19th Century this was the setting for the Charge of the Light Brigade and the ministrations of Florence Nightingale. We might also want to recall the assurances Hitler gave in the 1930s, that his military incursions into Czechoslovakia and then Poland were only to respond to the legitimate concerns of ethnic Germans, and that he had no further territorial ambitions. At that time, the leaders of nations were split between appeasers and isolationists and those who followed the Latin maxim, 'si vis pacem, para bellum' - if you wish for peace, prepare for war. Those who listened to Radio 4 over the conflict in Crimea will have heard the same divided opinions. Whilst I am quoting famous maxims, I might well add this further view of history, 'Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose' the more things change the more they remain the same.

In fact, I am not sure that is entirely true. I suspect that deep down most people who live in the West can no longer muster the patriotic or idealistic military fervour in evidence in 1914 and lampooned in Oh! What a Lovely War! It is hard to imagine a ready acceptance that we have any responsibility to defend people in a far away country. This was, of course, Chamberlain's view of the fate of Czechoslovakia in 1938. Perhaps it is that, through the conflicts of the 19th and 20th Century, we have learnt that war is futile and we are more instinctively pacifists. Or perhaps, less idealistically, we have decided that fighting is only worthwhile when our own interests are immediately threatened. Whichever it is, there is no doubt that history is an important teacher.

Public Speaking and Debating

On Thursday 6 February, Cokethorpe's Third Form Public Speaking Team braved the elements to participate in the Regional Final of the Rotarian's Youth Speaks Competition. Following the success of their first round topic Boys should be allowed to wear skirts to school they took on the more challenging and darker topic of People suffering from self-inflicted illnesses should not be entitled to free health care from the NHS (such as type two diabetes brought on by overeating, lung diseases brought on by smoking, or liver disease as a result of excessive alcohol consumption). The topic proved very controversial with both the audience and the judges. Sam Biles (Third Form, Gascoigne), Wilf Cartwright (Third Form, Queen Anne) and Edward Charter (Third Form, Vanbrugh) acquitted themselves well as they handled their chosen topic with maturity and sensitivity.

Oxford Union Debate

On Thursday 20 February, Thomas Binnie (Upper Sixth, Harcourt) and Francis Plummer (Upper Sixth, Queen Anne) were asked to speak and perform at the Oxford Union. The Union is one of the world's most prestigious debating societies, with an unparalleled reputation for bringing international guests and speakers to Oxford. The debate was a comedic charity event in aid of an Oxford homelessness group. The motion for the debate was the Oscar Wilde quotation that 'nothing worth knowing can be taught'. Thomas and Francis performed a hilarious musical speech, briefly introduced by Mr Farrow, in opposition to the motion that in fact there was something society needed to learn about sexism in popular music. The pupils were in skilled company with the Cambridge Footlights and the Oxford Revue proposing and opposing the motion respectively. Both the Revue and Footlights have aired the talents of some of the foremost British comedians and actors of the last century and Thomas and Francis more than met the high standard of the evening.

Third Form Career Reflections

Cokethorpe was delighted to welcome back two Old Cokethorpeans who shared their experiences with Third Form pupils about life after School. The first talk was from Dominic Hagues (2007, Feilden) who gave pupils an outline of how he has progressed to his current career as a Civil Engineer. Dominic secured a position as an engineer with Crossrail London where he now enjoys long productive days on the impressive underground project.

The legal profession and related careers was the topic of the next talk from Alex Shorey (2005, Feilden). Alex gave a

presentation on the route to becoming a solicitor and the type of person suited to working in this dynamic, fast moving profession. He now works at Irwin Mitchell Solicitors in Birmingham where he specialises in work place illnesses. Many thanks to both for taking the time to give pupils this valuable insight into life after Cokethorpe.

WWI Hospital

On Friday 21 March, re-enactors from The Field Ambulance transformed the Chapel into a Regimental Aid Post. Pupils from the Third Form were transported back to the trenches of the Western Front as part of the History Department's First World War syllabus. Guy Aston and Peter Hobbs, as captains in the Royal Army Medical Corps, gave pupils a different perspective on The Great War, bringing to life both the horror and the humour.



English Literary Recitals

Mrs Miller gave the first Literary Recital of the Lent Term entitled *Trapped* where pupils were taken on a tour of mental and physical entrapment. This culminated with a short piece by Doris Lessing about a boy's efforts to hold his breath and swim an underwater passage, nearly paying the ultimate price.

Mr White's *Shells* was a Literary Recital with a difference, throwing the ball back into the court of the pupils and generating creative ideas based around the idea of a shell. He offered a variety of stimuli which caused quite a stir as photos were strewn over the floor accompanied by a sound scape of waves and bombs. Rosie Turner (Upper Sixth, Queen Anne) interpreted the sounds of the sea, dancing beautifully around the pupils and over the images. This provoked some extraordinary discussion and some wonderful creative ideas based around the theme. Pupils explored war, dreams, sounds and the rhythm of the oceans in a fantastic plenary to the creative exercise.

The final Literary Recital of the term saw Ms Mountain take pupils around the world in *Voices from Afar.* Armed with a huge map, a piece of string and a few willing assistants; the English Department's newest member of staff read stories from forests to urban jungles and desert plains to snowy wastes. Ultimately demonstrating that, whilst everywhere is different, everyone's concerns are very much the same.

Physics Trip to CERN

Upper Sixth Physics students visited the main site of CERN at Meyrin just outside of Geneva and saw some fascinating exhibits of the history of particle physics and the development of European nuclear research. The group were given a personal guided tour of two cutting edge facilities and were fortunate enough to be shown round the only anti-hydrogen production facility in the world. By seeing the machines and facilities up close, students were able to see the exact workings of objects described in class and studied for months. During the tour there were plenty of questions posed to the guide regarding supersymmetry, black holes, string theory, the history of quantum mechanics and a myriad of other areas of physics!

The trip also included a walking tour of Lausanne with plenty of opportunities to marvel at the gothic architecture and history of both Lausanne and Geneva. The trip culminated with a relaxing boat trip around Lake Geneva with the stunning Alps providing a backdrop to a truly beautiful view.

Classical Civilisation Theatre Trip

Students have been studying Aristophanes since the start of the Lent Term and have enjoyed the comedy of his plays. On Tuesday 11 February, they had the opportunity to see a live production of one of Aristophanes' plays, The Clouds, at the Bloomsbury Theatre in London. As soon as it started, students were engaged by its humour and directness. The play sustained their attention as it appealed to all through the script's wit and humour. An example is Socrates' constant sluggishness and endless madness that had the whole audience laughing. The actors portrayed Aristophanes' work to such a professional level, making it incredibly accurate and faithful to the conventions of ancient Athenian theatre. From interaction with the crowd (dragging a poor audience member up on to the stage for mockery), to foolish sound effects from the cast, students enjoyed their acting talents, which provided a precise portrayal of how past Greek actors would have acted. The Chorus provided tongue-in-cheek comedy through their quirkiness, parading around the stage like fools while dancing and singing. Their 'quirkiness', however, proved a winner with the audience.

The play complemented the School's reading of Aristophanes and enabled the students to experience Aristophanes not just through manuscript but live on stage.

Black Country Museum Visit

Upper First pupils visited the Black Country Museum as part of their historical study of the Industrial Revolution. Pupils went down a real coal mine that was in use during the period, and experienced what life would have been like in the 1800's in a reconstructed town. They also learnt about the introduction of canals and the way in which they were a fundamental driving force behind the progress of the Industrial Revolution.

Special thanks go to the Headmaster for his generosity, the assistance of the Foundation Office and the RADA in-house team. This was a truly wonderful experience and the Drama Department would like to thank everyone involved.

The cast held a collection after the three performances and raised a total of £606.84 for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

Senior School Production

The Lent Term production is one of the most eagerly anticipated events of the year and *Oh! What a Lovely War!* was an outstanding example of the collective creativity of many different disciplines to be found at Cokethorpe. This improvised and experimental piece from Joan Littlewood's theatre company was ripe material for the experimental nature of Cokethorpe's Drama and Music Departments. The performance was an explosive mix of naturalistic performances, stylised scenes, tub-thumping songs, mesmerising dance, heart-breaking monologues and all laced together with live music and original compositions.

With over 100 members, the cast and crew are too numerous to mention individually, but there were some standout performances. Jacob Yolland (Upper Sixth, Gascoigne) excelled as the MC, mischievously and irreverently setting the pace and energy for the whole play. Katie Buckley (Upper Sixth, Harcourt) and Harry Lovibond (Lower Sixth, Queen Anne) once again proved themselves versatile and professional throughout the production, with Tom Amor (Lower Sixth, Queen Anne) ludicrously ignorant as the much maligned Douglas Haig. His on-stage wife, played by Clare Berry (Fourth Form, Queen Anne), marked a deliciously comic performance and was a highlight of the evening. Throughout the play, the superb Tooting Terriers kept us entertained and drove the rollicking music and story along. Their members; Tom Christensen (Fifth Form, Swift), Christian Ettinger (Lower Sixth, Harcourt), Henry Plumridge (Lower Sixth, Gascoigne), Wilf Cartwright (Third Form, Queen Anne) and Paige Rowe (Lower First, Harcourt) were brilliant in their laid back riffs and boot-marching classics and set the mood for every scene.

Rosie Turner (Upper Sixth, Feilden) and Anna Withey (Upper Sixth, Harcourt) worked hard this term to choreograph two outstanding dance pieces. The first dance explored the symbolic exclusion of objectors with white feathers and the second, the terrifying and unpredictable nature of gas in trench warfare. Both were remarkable in their grace and modernism, fusing classical technique with traces of street, and all dancers must be congratulated on their excellent performances. They were dancing to original electronic compositions by Ross Battersby (Upper Sixth, Gascoigne) who deftly captured the sweet melancholy of loss with the nightmarish screeching of warfare and 'all hell let loose'. Praise must also go to all the members of the costume, props, lighting and sound departments and the stage crew who worked very hard to make the series of disconnected sequences look beautiful and transition seamlessly.















Frantic Assembly Theatre Trip

Sixth Form Drama and Theatre Studies students returned to Warwick Arts Centre in March to see Frantic Assembly's compelling and disturbing thriller *The Believers*. This darkly comic and visually entrancing production was a theatrical experience that made a strong impression on the audience.



Lower First Soap Operas

Pupils in Lower First have been creating their own original soap operas. Exploring various creative elements such as characterisation and devising scripts, the pupils have worked in small teams to create some dynamic cliff-hangers which were then filmed and evaluated.



Secrets and Lies

As part of the Exploration of Dramatic Performance unit, the A2 Drama candidates presented an original, devised piece of theatre to a full house in The Shed on Tuesday 4 March. *Secrets and Lies* was the set stimulus which the ensemble used to create a unique and sometimes hard-hitting production.

The social, cultural, historical and political issues included the exploration of the Hillsborough tragedy, the invasion of Iraq and Afghanistan, corruption in the BBC, the treatment of suspected terrorists, phone hacking and the secret experiments carried out by MK Ultra. This mature and creative production provided plenty of food for thought and demonstrated the student's high level of ability in Drama.



War Horse Theatre Trip

On Friday 27 March the Fourth Form Drama students travelled to London to see the National Theatre's production of *War Horse* at the New London Theatre. For those pupils that made up the cast for the recent production of *Oh! What a Lovely War!* this theatre trip could not have been more poignant. The horror and needless sacrifice of man and animal was brought to the stage with grace, beauty and ingenuity.



Physical Theatre

The Upper First Drama pupils performed a selection of pieces in the style of Physical Theatre. Born out of their superbly vivid imaginations, the audience were treated to a futuristic prison break in a deadly game show, a journey through the history of video games and a surreal adventure into a land made entirely from food. This highly enjoyable performance demonstrated the co-operative skills of this very talented group.

Arts Academy

This term the groups have been preparing for their LAMDA exams which will be held in early May. Practitioners Workshop

In an independent learning project, Fourth Form GCSE Drama students researched three different theatre practitioners; Stanislavski, Artaud and Brecht and then ran a practical workshop to impart their knowledge to the rest of the class.

In order to illustrate their learning, each group was given an identical stimulus, the tale of *Little Red Riding Hood* and created their own devised interpretations of the story in the style of their chosen practitioners. This yielded some outstanding results and has given the cohort a solid understanding of three major theatrical practitioners.




Chris Prendergast Visit

Enlightenment Lectures

'It was a great pleasure to be asked to speak to the Sixth Form in this anniversary centenary year of the start of World War One. As I explored in my talk, we need to look at the First World War not as a set of gates which shut off most previous social and military history, but rather the culmination of a series of social and industrial developments that occurred through the nineteenth century.'

Despite the many social changes the war brought about, Dr Caddick-Adams showed us that from the point of view of the military historian, the enduring themes throughout history remain the same. The focus remains on people and the paramount need for communication, contact and collaboration.'

'Many thanks to Cokethorpe for inviting me to talk about my research and the book I have written about the illegal graffiti subculture in London and New York. Looking at illustrations of the different forms, styles and locations of graffiti, we explored how young men can use crime, danger and the written word to construct identity and override constraints which may limit them in 'real life'. The students had some thought provoking questions and we enjoyed some animated debate and discussion following the talk.'

'It was fascinating to have a new insight into a social phenomenon that people commonly see and simply walk past or dismiss as vandalism and nothing more. We learnt the codes and rules of the graffiti subculture, by which most artists abide, and the consequences and connotations should these rules be broken. Dr Macdonald stressed the importance of the alter egos that the graffiti writers present in their tags and the boost of self-confidence and self-awareness it gives them; such is the basis of the entire subculture.'

Geography Field Trip to Wales

The series was rounded off by Dr Nancy Macdonald, Qualitative and Ethnographic Specialist, whose lecture The Pen is Mightier than the Sword proved to be quite a catalyst for debate.

History and Politics New York and Washington Trip



the Washington Monument. The final day included the opportunity to meet a member of an international law firm and a visit to Arlington Cemetery.

A Level English Theatre Trips

On Thursday 29 January, a group of A Level English Language and Literature students squeezed into the Burton Taylor Studio at the Oxford Playhouse to enjoy a performance of Harold Pinter's Betrayal. The production, presented by Oxford University Students, was thought provoking in its interpretation of the text. Due to the unconventional chronology, the audience is made aware of the conclusion of the story in the first scene, allowing them to consider how their knowledge of the future alters their perception of the past. The Director wanted the audience to consider whether their memories have an inherent and perfectly constructed linear narrative, what memories look like and whether there is danger in memory. It was a challenging and engaging look at human dynamics and relations.





On Tuesday 18 March the group returned to the Oxford Playhouse to enjoy a performance of Tennessee Williams' A Streetcar Named Desire. As with Betrayal, it was provocative in terms of the Director's interpretation of the text and the portrayal of Stanley has been a catalyst for considerable discussion.

Enlightenment Lectures

'I was very pleased to be asked to speak to the Sixth Form about CSI -Crime Scene Insects. The real life of a forensic entomologist is far from the Gil Grissom glamour of CSI. Much of my work involves odd hours, attention to detail over several months and involves contact with people across almost every discipline. The large and interested group seemed to be very appreciative of the complexities of the work, were deeply attentive, and their questions were very perceptive too.

'Dr Whittaker provided our Sixth Formers with a most enlightening talk in respect of her work linked to Forensic Entomology, a field of expertise that is limited to only three specialists in this country. Dr Whittaker regularly works with the police and explained to our students how, by identifying certain species of fly at any one time around a dead body, can determine the time of death of a corpse. In legal terms this work is of crucial importance. We certainly had an audience of intriqued students which triggered a host of questions. It is surprising where a Biology Degree can take you.'

Cross Fit

Sport Academy students were given a fantastic opportunity to take part in a cross fit class in AOB on Friday 21 March. A cross fit trainer came in to take the session, where pupils engaged in some high intensity training involving push ups, step ups and shuttles. The pupils worked extremely hard and gained a lot from the session, in particular learning to warm up before exercise properly and the correct and most effective way to do so.

The Perfect Warm Up

The main aim of a warm up before you go out to play or train is to effectively and efficiently prepare your body for the actions it is about to perform.

Your warm up should repeat as many of the actions you will do in your sport, in a controlled but dynamic manner to:

- prepare your muscles for the actions they are going to endure during the match/training
- reduce the risk of muscle strains
- elicit heart rates that will be similar in the match/training

A dynamic warm up should include the following;

- General Movement 5-10 minutes of movement that increases your heart rate
- Joint Mobility controlled movement in a dynamic motion (to simulate the movements of your joints within your sport)
- Dynamic Flexibility- develop a range of movement in your muscles, which will replicate the movements of the match training environment.

Warwick Challenge

On Saturday 15 March the Cokethorpe Shooting Team travelled to Warwickshire to compete in the Warwick Challenge, a competition open to the Southern Region schools.

After an encouraging start nerves started to show, resulting in a disappointing score over the final two of the eight 'stands'. Competition is, of course, a very different animal to a training day.




Burns Night

Turning Back the Pages

Below are news items from past issues of *The Bell Tower* and *The Peacock*.

20 Years Ago (1994)

It was vital that the inaugural Cokethorpe Rugby Club Tour to Holland was a success and thankfully it proved to be so, beyond our wildest expectations. We were accommodated in a plush business conference centre. It was an ideal place to stay and relax after a gruelling days rugby, with its' 1000 rooms, swimming pool, sauna, squash courts......

25 Years Ago (1989)

The end of January meant once again that Cokethorpe was engulfed in cross-country fever. However, the usual feelings of forthcoming pain and torture were somewhat mitigated by the prospect of a new, flat and more interesting course at Hardwick Leisure Park.

30 Years Ago (1984)

In the not too distant future Computer Studies and/or Programming must appear on the timetable at some stage for every pupil. Every future school leaver should be conversant with the computer keyboard and have at least some understanding of the computer's capabilities and influence on society.

35 Years Ago (1979)

The cricket report usually opens with a general broadside against the inclemency of the elements. If anything the conditions were more inhospitable than in previous years. In fact we dripped and shivered through the second wettest and fourth coldest Spring this century; it snowed in May and hailed in June.

40 Years Ago (1974)

The Boat Club - Our wonderful new 'launch' bucked in mid-stream, threw the driver on to the hand throttle and crashed into a cruiser at speed, cutting one of the hulls in two. An exciting rescue operation saved the engine from damage but repair work is still going on to the superstructure.

45 Years Ago (1969)

Cokethorpe Park Menagerie. The old greenhouse in the market garden was converted into a private zoo and the idea of having animals at Cokethorpe was born.

50 Years Ago (1964)

The Cokethorpe Society played their three 'fixtures'. The rugger match was played doggedly in blinding rain and nobody is quite sure of the score, though all agree that the Old Boys were trounced.

Diary of a Cokethorpe Boy 1960 - 1963

We are very grateful to OC David Evans for sending us the diary he kept whilst he was a pupil at Cokethorpe from 1960 - 1963. It gives a fascinating insight into everyday life at Cokethorpe School and is illustrated with photographs. Some extracts are printed below.

4 May 1960 - Age 14. Came to Cokethorpe for the first time.
14 July - Today was supposed to be the end of the world!
Ha! Ha! Went rowing in a four. No television in the evening.
7 Feb 1961 - No games so rode into Ducklington. Went to see Mr Allen about joining the Navy. Almost knocked myself out on a wall in the outer courtyard when playing with

20 Feb - A nice day, games OK. Had a letter. Everyone said BOO! in supper because there wasn't any more bread and we all had half an hour detention.

24 March - My birthday (aged 15). Had lots of letters. Played with Spears. Watched some films shown by the police on road safety.

5 July - Went rowing and had compliments from my crew for going through the bridge. Athletics in the evening.

20 Nov - Went to see the crashed plane at Stanton Aerodrome. A bit of blood. It happened yesterday, three were killed.

8 Feb 1962 - Played rugger. Failed in History test. Buchner went down with flu. There are about eighteen boys down with it now. Not me, touch wood.

24 Feb - Had a clarinet lesson. A fire was started in the dorm.

25 Feb - We were in trouble about the fire. We went to Mr Allen who did not punish us. The film was *Ghost Train*.

6 May - Went canoeing with Andy, Jock, Pete and co. Came down the rapids with Webb. Got soaked. No film show.

26 Sept - Bought a miniature Perdio Radio for eight and a half quineas (they are forbidden in school!).

14 Oct - Took David out. We went to Benson and then to the aerodrome where we drove. The starter broke and when we fixed it we went to The Fleece for lunch

8 Dec - The weather was very wet and we were meant to go for a run. I got Emmerson to tick my name off and watched the television instead.

29 Jan 1963 - This morning I helped clean the brass. At 2.30pm I changed and washed but couldn't find a collar stud so we bought one as we went through Cirencester.

10 Feb - Freezing again and a blizzard. We set out on our bikes for the frozen gravel pits where in the summer we swim. I borrowed Gillman's ice skates and once I got started I was dragged across the lake behind a bicycle.

21 March - After lunch we rehearsed the play in the Corinthian Room.

26 March - There was a dress rehearsal this afternoon. We left at 2pm and changed in the dressing room. The scenery had not been painted and it was pretty chaotic with stage hands walking around.

30 March - The play went well, but Willesden who plays Sir Andrew did not arrive until 7.35pm and we were worried. We celebrated the final performance with cider.

13 May - Lunch consisted of two thin slices of corned beef and a dollop of mashed potato followed by stodge and custard.
