A Level Drama Performances



The Fach System

Singers and the roles they play are classified according to their vocal ranges using an especially organised system of classification called The Fach System.

Male singers are classified as bass, bass-baritone, baritone, tenor and countertenor. Female singers are classified, as contralto, mezzo-soprano and soprano.

Each of these classifications has subcategories, such as lyric soprano, coloratura, soubrette, spinto, and dramatic soprano, which associate the singer's voice with the roles most suitable to the vocal timbre and quality and its range, or tessitura.

Opera's Origins

Opera started in Italy during the Renaissance and the word comes from the Italian opera *in musica* meaning 'a musical work'. The very first opera *Dafne* (1597) was by Jacopo Peri and was a dramatic play. Over the last 400 years new operas have been created all over the world.

Coliseum Facts

The Coliseum Theatre (also known as the London Coliseum) is one of London's largest and best equipped theatres, opening in 1904. The Company changed its name from Sadler's Wells Opera Company to the English National Opera in 1974 and bought the freehold of the building for £12.8m.

The lectures, given to all post-16 students with the current aim of broadening their outlook on the world, are held roughly twice per term and draw upon a range of speakers from all walks of life, experience, achievements and academic disciplines.

Professor Barrie Jones gave an illustrated talk about the current searches and speculations regarding Life in the Universe. Sir Max Hastings, previously editor of the Daily Telegraph,



delivered the last of the speeches, contemplating what it is to be a hero.

Business Sponsorship Interviews

23 Cokethorpe students from Years 11 and 12 put themselves forward as part of the School's ground breaking Business Sponsorship initiative. Students were competing for the opportunity to carry out an internship for several weeks with a leading business. This is a radical departure from the traditional British model of encouraging young people to carry out a one or two week work experience programme. The Business Sponsorship Scheme enables students to carry out a placement of significant quality involving a wide breadth of activities and responsibilities as well as the company making a contribution to their fees.

Students were able to select from a wide range of possibilities involving law, engineering, manufacturing, automotive, communications, construction and market research. The interviews were fairly challenging and gave the students a good idea of what to expect as they eventually pursue their careers after graduating from university.

The feedback from the business representatives has been excellent and it is no exaggeration to say that they have been impressed with the way in which all the candidates have presented themselves. The School is extremely proud of all its students and they were all perfect ambassadors for Cokethorpe.

The important thing for all those involved to remember is that regardless of whether they were ultimately successful in their application or not it is hoped that they will look favourably on the whole process. The opportunity for the students to put themselves forward for such an innovative opportunity and receive feedback on their performance, so they can make improvements for the future, is one to be valued.

It was a real pleasure for the organisers to be involved in the process and the Head of Sixth Form is filled with great optimism at the prospect of the already talented Sixth Form accommodating such dynamic and ambitious Year 11 students.

Boys' Wine Tasting Evening

Earlier this term the Sixth Form were asked by the Headmaster to choose a General Studies lecture that would particularly appeal to them. The gentlemen chose to learn more about wines, their production and the social norms associated with their consumption. Ted Sandbach, the owner of the Oxford Wine Company, delivered a first rate talk on 'wines of the world' in the most appropriate of settings - the Corinthian Room.

Later in the evening there was an 'open tasting' of three different whites and three different reds and, following this, a blind tasting competition. Oliver Wenman triumphed by correctly identifying all six wines and was awarded a bottle of Champagne. It was a thoroughly enlightening and enjoyable evening and Mr Sandbach was keen to be quoted as saying 'What a superb level of interest your young gentlemen have shown. I have been most impressed with the quality of their questions.' As yet, the School is not offering an A Level in Viticulture.

Jubilee Lectures



With tickets sold out weeks in advance for all four nights, the excitement surrounding the show reached fever pitch for all concerned.

For the directors, musicians, cast and crew, the months of planning and rehearsals suddenly disappeared and opening night arrived. A gleaming, chrome laden 1950's Cadillac purred its way up the drive to play the vital part of Grease Lightening and thanks to the hard work and creative talents of Mrs Furneaux and Mrs Mace the costumes, hair and make-up were stunning.

The professional sound of the band was equalled only by the hideous-ness of those polyester shirts! Opening night was rain-free much to the relief of the backstage crew who had dozens of scene changes to cope with (and to those parents and friends who waited outside on the off-chance of a seat!). The opening number was a high energy



flash of colour that had everyone enjoying themselves immediately. The vocal performances were strong and the choreography energetic.

Jack Gibbons

Mr Gibbons' previous visits to Cokethorpe had been arranged by the late Mr Cranham, and Mr Gibbons dedicated this performance to his memory. The recital ranged from the exuberant complexity of the music of George Gershwin to the delightful intimacy of a Chopin etude - included as a particular favourite of Mr Cranham's.

One of Mr Gibbons' tales about the hazards of performing was the time he crossed his left hand over his right to play a high passage of music, only to find that his hand had gone up his other sleeve rather than onto the keyboard!

Mr Gibbons left us in no doubt about his mastery of the piano: his performances of some of the most demanding pieces of Nineteenth Century piano repertoire, and three of his own compositions, were followed by a performance of Gershwin's complex Rhapsody in Blue.

For Mr Gibbons, the demanding solo piano part was clearly not enough and uniquely he included the full orchestral parts as well.

It takes its name from the 1950s United States working-class youth subculture, the greasers. The musical, set in 1959 in fictional Rydell High in Chicago, tackles such social issues as teenage pregnancy and gang violence.

The Broadway production opened 7 June, 1972 at the Broadhurst Theatre, transferring to the Royale. and then the Majestic, where it closed on 13 April, 1980, after 3,388 performances.

The show went on to become a West End hit, a hugely successful film, a popular 1994 Broadway revival, and a staple of regional theatre, summer stock, community theatre, and high school drama groups.

Kendal Mint Cake

Facts

- Kendal Mint Cake was carried to the top of Mount Everest in May 1953, on the first successful expedition to the summit
- Kendal Mint Cake can now rank as one of the world's most travelled sweets

History:

- Mr S T Clarke, the founder of the Lake District company that manufactures Kendal Mint Cake (and is now run by the fourth generation of the family), started out as a sweet wholesaler when he was invalided out of the 1914-1918 war
- When he was unable to obtain supplies of Kendal Mint Cake during the summer season he purchased an old recipe and started manufacturing his own
- This proved successful, but was given a tremendous boost when after advertising in a climbing magazine
 Mr Clarke was approached by the 1953 expedition to Everest, to see whether he could supply mint cake within 7 days
- It had to be packed in high altitude packs for inclusion in the supplies to be sent on ahead, hence the need for haste
- Fortunately he had sufficient stock to meet their needs, and his staff willingly gave up their sweet ration coupons to comply with the law
- These coupons were later refunded by the Ministry of Food
- Sir Edmund Hilary and Sirdar Tensing ate this mint cake on top of Everest as they gazed at the countryside down below. Tensing also left some to appease his 'gods'
- The publicity surrounding this event increased sales of mint cake to hikers and climbers, and to visitors to the Lake District

How it is made

- Mint cake is still made in traditional copper pans on gas boilers
- It is made by combining sugar, glucose and water then boiling more fiercely in smaller pots
- After cooling for several minutes, half on ounce of oil of peppermint is added to every 40 lb of mix
- The blend is poured by hand into shallow trays where it hardens quickly
- Kendal Mint Cake has a subtle but stimulating flavour, cool in summer, fiery in winter and has a unique blend of textures, smooth and hard, but always creamy

PROJECT 2007

Project 2007 was launched as a fundraising target for the anniversary year.

The School has many plans for the future, and would like to make it possible for people to contribute to a permanent memorial of the anniversary year. Project 2007 is the vehicle for this, a way in which contributions can be made either for a specific purpose or to a general fund.

The School has a wide-ranging portfolio of development projects. With increased competition, upward pressure on fees and political and economic uncertainties, independent schools are more dependent than ever on the support of their current parents, former pupils and friends to continue their mission.

The financial support of parents and former pupils at Cokethorpe was last sought over 20 years ago to help fund the current Design Technology and Art building in the Upper Quad. The cost of the School's Development Plans for the next ten years - to enhance the quality

of the School's provision for current and future generations of Cokethorpe pupils - could exceed £8 million, and not all of this could be realistically funded from cash-flow or prudent borrowings.

Consideration is therefore being given to a Fund Raising Campaign to raise say £2 million, £1.5m for capital projects and £0.5m for a Bursary Fund, to be launched in 2008. In the meantime Project 2007 is a relatively small campaign to raise £50,000 during the Fiftieth Anniversary Year, in order to make a start towards some of the projects, probably half for capital projects and half for bursaries.

As of March 10, 2007, 1.114 billion people use the Internet according to Internet World Stats (that's 16.9% of the world population).

A 2002 survey of 2,024 million Web pages determined that by far the most Web content was in English: 56.4%; next were pages in German (7.7%), French (5.6%) and Japanese (4.9%).

The Indexed Web contains at least 14.06 billion pages (Friday, 23 March, 2007).
